Overview

Civics is a one-term course that is usually taken during the freshman year. Its intent is to provide students with the understanding and knowledge of the American government at the state and federal levels. The content of this course examines the role our government plays in our lives and how we can positively affect it as well. A heavy emphasis will be placed on; personal rights and responsibilities, citizenship, the role of government, the Constitution and Bill of Rights, and the three branches of the U.S. government.

Objectives include:

- 1. Students will understand the role of the different American government agencies.
- 2. Students will acquire a comprehensive understanding of checks and balances within our government.
- 3. Students will understand the role of American diplomacy, both foreign and domestic, and both successful and unsuccessful attempts at using it.
- 4. Students will be able to envision the future role of the U.S. Government and its new roles it will play in our citizen's lives.
