Preparation/Classroom:

Late, Missing, and Incomplete Work

When you turn in late work or work you completed late due to an absence, there are admit slips you must fill out and attach to the late work or work done after an absence. I will not grade/give credit to any late work without this slip. Also, no late work will be accepted past 9 days, unless there has been a one on one conversation with Ms. Spleiss first.

Electronic Devices:
