Prompt Book Level 3

A **Production Book** is a book that the Director creates when she/he is about to direct a play. It helps her/him to make sure she/he fully understands the play and how it will all come together. Your project will involve you creating many of the pieces required for a Prompt Book (minus including a copy of the script with *all* the blocking pre-written in).

After you have chosen a play and read it thoroughly, you will need to put together a packet that answers the following questions. You may write the paper as a giant outline if would like. The key is that you are addressing all the questions and providing detailed responses. I STRONGLY advise you to use your in class work time or you are going to have a lot of homework. Typically, a Prompt Book should be done in a 3-ring binder, but in this case you may just staple the papers together.

I. INTERPRETATION

- A. Statement of theme
- B. Anticipated problems of the production
- C. Given Circumstances
 - 1. Environmental Facts
 - a. Geographic location
 - b. Date
 - c. Economic status
 - d. Political environment
 - e. Social environment
 - f. Religious environment
 - 2. Previous action (What happened before the play began?)
- D. General index of feeling (the overall mood of the play)
- E. Discussion of <u>at least</u> two main characters (a real Prompt Book would actually do all)
 - 1. Super-objective
 - 2. Physical analysis (What does the character looks like?)
 - 3. Social analysis (What are the character's relationships with others like?)
 - 4. Emotional/Psychological analysis (What is this character like mentally?)
 - 5. Moral analysis (Does this character make good or bad choices? What does the character think about good and evil? Are they good or evil?)
 - 6. How does the character change throughout the play?
