Each unit covers multiple Minnesota Social Studies standards that are assessed at the end of each unit. Listed below are a few of these standards that have been designated as essential. Each essential standard will include multiple formative and summative assessments and include several sub-standards.

Assessments (Summative Unit Assessments/Projects) (70% of your trimester grade)

Formative assessments will be given during a unit to track student understanding of unit standards, but will not count towards the final grade. Summative assessments will be given at the end of each unit and will evaluate student understanding of all of the standards for each specific unit. Reading standards will also be assessed during each unit. Opportunities will be given to retest on each standard on all unit tests. Projects are different forms of assessment that require extended class time to complete. We will do a variety of large and small projects throughout the year.

Learning Activities (20% of your trimester grade)

Learning activities may include maps, mapping labs, notes, in class activities, digital assignments, etc. If a student is absent, these assignments may need to be done as homework outside of class.
